

Example Ode to an Ordinary Object

An ode is a type of poem that gives thanks and shows gratitude. After making observations about the form and function of some ordinary objects, you will be choosing one of them to write your poem of thanks.

Directions: Read this example of an ode to pencils, a tool we use everyday. As you read, circle where you see different parts of odes being used:

- Odes are about an ordinary object
- Odes give praise or thanks (Oh, ____!)
- Odes speak directly to the object
- Use adjectives to describe the object (What does it look like?)
- Use verbs to bring the object to life (What does the object do?)
- Use figurative language to describe the object (Can you use a simile to compare this?)
- Use repeated lines
