### How many of this item did you count, and where did you find it?

I counted 22 leaves. All 22 leaves I counted were on one branch of a tree.

#### What do I already know about this item?

Leaves are an important part of a plant. They come in a variety of shapes, sizes, and colors. Ginkgo leaves and oak tree leaves are easy to identify.



#### What is one question you have about this item?

I noticed that leaves have thin veins on their surface. Why do leaves have veins, and what do those veins do?

#### What is the answer to your question?

Veins inside a leaf work a lot like the veins inside of me! A leaf's veins help carry water and nutrients throughout the plant. Veins also support the weight of the leaf to make it durable.
